

# BROOKLYN COLLEGE TO GRADUATE 2,077

## Exercises Set for Next Sunday — 2 Ex-Students Who Died in War to Be Honored

Brooklyn College will confer degrees and diplomas on the 2,077 members of its second largest graduating class at 5 P. M. next Sunday.

The commencement exercises will be the college's twenty-seventh. The largest class, 2,210 members, was graduated in June, 1949.

Dr. Carroll V. Newson, Associate State Commissioner of Education, will deliver the address at the exercises, to be held on the grass-covered campus quadrangle.

Degrees with departmental honors will be conferred on 137 graduates by Dr. Harry D. Gidensee, president of the college. Post-honors certificates of honor will be awarded to the families of two students who were killed in World War II. The two men, who were juniors when they entered military training, were Mark Dauber and Bernard J. Vogel.

The commencement invocation will be offered by the Rev. Phillips P. Elliott of the First Presbyterian Church of Brooklyn. Judge Anthony J. DiGiovanna of the State Supreme Court will administer the Euphonic oath of good citizenship. Mary S. Ingraham, chairman of the Brooklyn College Administrative Committee of the Board of Higher Education, will deliver the greetings of the board. Prof. George S. Tulloch will be the chief

marshal of the academic procession.

Baccalaureate degrees summum laude will go to twelve graduates. They are Ruth Herzberg, Helen Pauline Liebel, Ruth B. Belter, Joseph Sucher, Jack Davis, Alan J. Goldman, Barbara H. Gottesman, Leah Ann Green, Adeline Horowitz, Florence C. Segal, Hans H. Tech and Hans H. Baruch. Mr. Baruch, who attained a straight A average in every course except physical education, has the top scholastic record in the class.

One hundred and ninety-eight Masters' degrees will be presented. The largest number, 146, will go to June graduates, February graduates will receive thirty-nine, and thirteen will go to students graduated last year.

The Brooklyn College chapter of Phi Beta Kappa, national honor scholastic fraternity, will initiate 134 students and graduates as members-in-course in ceremonies to be held at 2 P. M. on Sunday. Members of the first class to be graduated from the college, the class of '32, will hold their first reunion on Sunday afternoon. Seventy-five of the original group of fifteen men and eighty women have been located and invited to the meeting.
